Patrick made this hymn. In the time of Loegare son of Niall it was made. The cause of making it, however, was to protect himself with his monks against the deadly enemies who were in ambush against the clerics. And this is a corselet of faith for the protection of body and soul against demons, and human beings, and vices. Everyone who shall sing it every day, with pious meditation on God, demons shall not stay before him. ay, with pious meditation on God, demons shail not stay before him. It will be a safeguard to him against every poison and envy: it will be a comma to him against sudden death: it will be a corslet to his soul after dying. Patrick sang this when the ambuscades were set against him by Loegaire that he might not go to Tara to sow the faith, so that there they seemed before the ambuscaders to be wild deer and a fawn after them, to wit, Benén; and faed fiada ('guard's cry') is its name.
